MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Australia Day is about the ever-evolving story of our nation – our history, our lives and, most of all, our people.

What it means to each of us depends on who we are, where we come from and how we came to be Australian; from the First Australians whose connection to this land continues for tens of thousands of years, to the descendants of settlers, children of migrants and those recently arrived.

This year, people and communities came together across the nation and took part in the day, their way. There were time-honoured practices of storytelling and wisdom-sharing alongside First Nations people; local citizenship ceremonies and multicultural events that recognise those who now call Australia home; and moments of respect for the freedoms we sometimes take for granted. As we say, we're all part of the story of Australia.

More than 600 events were hosted by councils and local community groups around the country to reflect, respect and celebrate with their communities on Australia Day 2024. These were supported by the National Australia Day Council's Australia Day Community Events Grants program, with \$4.755 million in funding provided through the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Grant applicants that collaborated with local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities were eligible to apply for additional funding, helping foster stronger ties in hundreds of locations around Australia. \$4.3 million was also provided for major events in cities around the country, organised by our Australia Day National Network. Our shared aim is to make the day as inclusive as possible for all Australians and to respect the many layers to our national day.

On the eve of Australia Day, the 2024 Australians of the Year were named: Professor Georgina Long AO & Professor Richard Scolyer AO; Yalmay Yunupiŋu; Emma McKeon AM; and David Elliott OAM. We can all be so proud of their inspiring service, contribution to others and excellence in their fields.

Whether you went to an organised event, gathered with family and friends or spent some time alone in reflection, we can all celebrate being part of a proud, ancient, multicultural nation that values the contribution of every citizen.

AUSTRALIA DAY 2024 OVERVIEW

PRIVATE WELCOME CEREMONY

Australia Day 2024 in Canberra, began with a Private Welcome Ceremony on the parklands of Lake Burley Griffin, attended by the Prime Minister, the Hon Anthony Albanese MP and Governor-General, His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley, AC DSC (Retd).

Supported by the NADC and hosted by the United Ngunnawal Elders Council, our nation's leaders gathered with the Traditional Custodians of the land to share a moment of reflection and respect.

This moving ceremony was broadcast live on ABC TV, following crosses to many morning smoking ceremonies in states and territories around the country.

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COMMUNITY EVENTS

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Local government and community organisations have long played a vital role in delivering Australia Day events.

In 2024, the NADC helped councils and not-forprofit community organisations deliver more than 600 local community events and activities on Australia Day through \$4.755 million in grants funding provided by the Federal Government.

Community Grants

In 2024, Australia Day Community Grant recipients received \$10,000 to organise, promote and host Australia Day events that encouraged their communities to reflect, respect and celebrate.

The NADC offered an additional \$5,000 to grant recipients who incorporated activities that encouraged reflection, respect and celebration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture.

The majority of grant recipients received the additional funding, providing opportunities for communities and councils to collaborate with local Indigenous groups.

All applicants were required to incorporate accessibility elements into their events to ensure universal accessibility for all.



NEW SOUTH WALES

Performances ranged from traditional dances to modern interpretations, adding layers of cultural richness to the celebration and showcasing the community's rich tapestry of cultures.





SYDNEY

Each year, the program in Sydney is strengthened through ongoing collaborations with First Nations spokespeople who contribute significantly to its narrative, creativity and authenticity.

As the sun rose over Sydney Harbour, the worldrenowned Sydney Opera House sails were illuminated with spectacular digital artwork by Kooma man Brett Leavy. Now in its fourth year, the Dawn Reflection offers a poignant acknowledgement to the remarkable contributions of Australia's first peoples.

The WugulOra Morning Ceremony, broadcast live on NITV, was attended by more than 2,000 people and cleansed the way for new beginnings. It celebrated the Gadigal people of the Eora nation through music, dance, language, storytelling and ceremony.

Australia Day Harbourfest offered free fun events and activities around Sydney Harbour and Circular Quay, including the iconic Ferrython, a Kidz Zone, the Royal Air Force Roulettes' aerial display and the Great Aussie BBQ.

In the evening, the Sydney Opera House forecourt and Circular Quay came alive for the Australia Day Live concert. Over 90,000 people enjoyed live musical performances by artists including Casey Donovan, Dami Im, William Barton and Kate Miller-Heidke, choreographed to a flotilla of yachts, projections on the Sydney Opera House sails and pyrotechnic displays.

MELBOURNE

The Official Flag Raising Ceremony, hosted by the Governor of Victoria and attended by the Premier of Victoria, marked the beginning of Melbourne's Australia Day at one of Victoria's most iconic buildings, Government House. Its annual Open Day has become the primary focal point of Australia Day celebrations.

A record number of over 20,000 visitors explored the historic State Apartments. They picnicked on the Western Lawn with food from culturallydiverse food stalls, watched a 21-gun salute and RAAF heritage aircraft flyover, and learned about community service organisations such as Cancer Council Victoria, the Royal Flying Doctor Service, Victoria Police and St John Ambulance Victoria.

Mainstage performances reflected the rich talent of Victorians, from the Australian Defence Force Airforce Band to a Bollywood flashmob on the lawn, a jazz ensemble to a powerful yidaki performance.

CANBERRA

A visually spectacular sky show dazzled over 100,000 people, using the canvas of the night sky to tell Australian stories.

Taking place over three nights including Australia Day, Flight was a trilogy of 12-minute drone shows over Lake Burley Griffin with accompanying narrative and music. The show had a particular focus on showcasing First Nations culture and included consultation with Ngunnawal elder Dr Caroline Hughes.

Following a Welcome to Country, the story was told of the wedge tail eagle (an influential totem) followed by an appreciation of the native flora and fauna unique to Australia. The drone show concluded with key moments in Australia's democratic history.

Canberrans also enjoyed night market stalls from over 80 local food vendors and artisans, along with roving performers that showcased Canberra's multicultural and vibrant community including Sumba, Chinese lion dragon and Bollywood dancers.

ADELAIDE

The Australia Day Council of South Australia's First Nations Open Circle guided the approach of the Mourning in the Morning smoking ceremony, held in the early hours of Australia Day.

CAMBODI

As the sun set, over 30,000 people gathered in Elder Park for Aus Lights on the River 2024. The Respecting Country Parade came across the Riverbank Pedestrian Bridge powered by the sounds of Japanese drummers, with thousands acknowledging their sense of belonging and showcasing their cultural identity.

Music performances, kids' entertainment, choir and immersive light installations on the riverbanks of the River Torrens followed, ending with a cinematic fireworks display. This year's program was inspired by creative visions of Belonging to Country and Connecting to Nature.

Over 120 local performing artists participated in the whole program, including representation from First Nations people and those from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.



Over 60,000 people attended Langley Park for the Reflect Respect Celebrate Film Dome. In consultation with City of Perth's Aboriginal Elders Advisory Group, the films explored dreamtime, evocative storytelling and featured unique flora and fauna through animations by Noongar artist Biara Martin. Merchandise goody bags and a photo booth were also a hit with families.

The annual Birak Concert celebrated Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture with live music, arts and crafts stalls in the Supreme Court Gardens, before the day ended with a spectacular Light Show of drones and fireworks.

DARWIN

The Australia Day Council Northern Territory (ADCNT) delivered a truly inclusive program that showcased the diversity of Territorians and honoured its First Nations people.

The annual Oz Run from Darwin Convention Centre saw 2,700 people complete the 2.5km or 5km tracks to reach Darwin Waterfront Lagoon for a smoking ceremony by the Larrakia families, traditional performances by Garramilla Dancers and a Welcome to Country by ADCNT Chair and Larrakia Elder Richard Fejo.




